Can You Tell Me?

WHAT ARE MY WORK BREAK ENTITLEMENTS?

AESES employees are entitled to breaks because of provincial legislation and the benefits negotiated during the bargaining process. Not all work areas have the same practice for lunch breaks though and the timing of breaks is sometimes regulated by the member's specific work area.

Both universities have paid coffee breaks. At UM, Article 11.2 states that full-time employees are entitled to two fifteen-minute paid work breaks per day. Employees working less than regular full-time hours in a day get one fifteen-minute paid break for each work period of at least 3.5 hours duration. At UW, Article 11.4 outlines the same conditions for paid breaks. At both universities, these paid breaks do not constitute time for the purposes of banking time. Paid work breaks can either be scheduled by the work area or the employee's supervisor may let the employee decide when to take their breaks.

Most employees have an unpaid hourlong meal break but some employees have half-hour unpaid breaks or even paid half-hour breaks where negotiated by Collective Agreement. At UM, Article 11.4 states that "time allocated for these [unpaid] breaks is determined at the unit level; supervisors will advise employees of the practice in their unit." This means that certain work areas may have hour-long breaks whereas some may have half-hour breaks. In either case, the unit should have a consistent practice for all employees. Additionally, UM Security Services (UMSS) employees are entitled to two paid half-hour meal breaks per twelvehour workday; this arrangement was separately negotiated under the UMSS Memorandum of Understanding. At UW, most employees have unpaid hour-long lunch breaks, however, Article 11.5 allows for meal breaks of less than 1 hour when both employer and employee mutually agree. At both universities, meal breaks of at least thirty minutes must be taken, as per Manitoba Employment Standards.

AESES Volunteers' Appreciation Banquet

Shortly after the resolution of that contract, she joined the AESES Board of Representatives where she has remained for 22 years. She continued her support to AESES which included 10 years on the Executive with a couple of months as Acting President and participated in several rounds of negotiations and bargaining over the years. Patti was the AESES representative on the EAP Committee for many years and served on the Staff Benefits Committee and more recently Chair of the AESES group.

In 2016, AESES affiliated with the Confederation of Canadian Unions. It was a long process to decide whether they were the right fit for the Association. Patti saw the wisdom of this affiliation and what it could mean for AESES' development. Her honest assessment of the national group was very much appreciated. She was also fortunate to take part in numerous conferences representing AESES.

Patti has always been invested in our union and unionism in general. Patti has made her mark on AESES as well as in the Kinesiology Department, and the University of Manitoba.

"Patti is one of our truly dedicated members who helped shape AESES into the organization it is today. Patti brought her advising skills to the board and executive tables. It was an incredible

experience for the years we shared at AESES. I could not have made it through my presidency without you; especially when I had a heart attack and you had to take the reins as president. Having an individual who is so trustworthy and dedicated is rare and Patti truly demonstrated those qualities when she stepped up to take those challenging reins. Patti, I wish you the very best for the future and humbly acknowledge your contributions and support for which I will be forever thankful. I heartily applaud your deserved honour, Tom."
